Course Overview:

Course Title: Sociology – I

Course Code: BALLB - 305

Semester: Third

Credits: 4

Medium of Instruction/Assessment: English

Objectives of the course:

This course aims to acquaint students with a general overview of Sociology and its relationship with other social sciences. It informs students about some of the fundamental concepts propounded by forefathers of Sociology, namely Karl Marx, Emile Durkheim and Max Weber. The course goes on to familiarize students with sociological imagination on several issues in context of South Asia. An interactive module has been designed, specifically for law students, to bring out the discussion on Social Control. The course includes ample use of audio-visual material such as documentaries and ethnographic films to enhance the students' capacity to look at a given social issue from multiple standpoints.

Assessment and Evaluation:

The course has a weightage of 100 marks. 75 % of the marks will be covered by the End Semester Examination; while as 25 % will constitute internal assessment to be done by the concerned instructor.

- (A) End Semester Examination: There will be ten questions in the Question paper with two from each unit. Students will have to answer five questions in all selecting one from each unit.
- **(B) Internal Assessment:** A student will be assessed and evaluated by the concerned teacher during the entire semester at regular intervals. This will be done by employing a wide range of methods including written tests, tutorials, term paper writing, presentations etc. Attendance of the students will also form a part of the internal assessment.
